



HISTORICAL SKETCH.

The United States Military Academy is a school for the practical and theoretical training of cadets for the military service. Upon completing its course satisfactorily, cadets are eligible for promotion and commission as second lieutenants in any arm or corps of the Army the duties of which they have been judged competent to perform.

The supervision and charge of the Academy are in the War Department under such officer or officers as the Secretary of War may assign to that duty (section 1331, Revised Statutes). In conformity with the provisions of this section, the Chief of Staff has been, by direction of the Secretary, charged with the supervision of matters in the War Department pertaining to the Academy.

The occupation of West Point as a military post took place on January 20, 1778, and has been continuous since that date. The earliest proposal for a military school for the United States was that of Brigadier General Henry Knox, Chief of Artillery (May, 1776). His plans were seconded by Colonel Alexander Hamilton and approved by General Washington, though they were not adopted in the form suggested before 1802, other counsels having temporarily prevailed.

On October 1, 1776 Congress passed a resolution appointing a committee to prepare a plan for "A Military Academy at the Army." The result was the resolution of June 20, 1777, providing for a Corps of Invalids "to serve as a military school for young gentlemen previous to their being appointed to marching regiments." The Invalid Corps was organized in July, 1777, and in 1781, at the request of Washington, was marched from Philadelphia to form part of the garrison at West Point, where an engineer school, a laboratory, and a library had already been established in three separate buildings.

On March 30, 1779, the Board of War adopted regulations for the Corps of Engineers and for the Sappers and Miners. These were promulgated in orders, July 30, 1779, by General Washington and provided for a plan of instruction to be carried into effect after approval by the Board and by the General-in-Chief. The plan contemplated lectures, by engineer officers, on fortification, mining, reconnaissance, encampments and the like. Practical experiments in gunnery were conducted at West Point as early as February, 1780. In 1783, after the cessation of hostilities, Washington, having been called upon for his views as to the peace establishment, laid the matter of a Military Academy before his officers at Newburg. He referred to it again in his message on December 3, 1793. The law of May 9, 1794, authorized the organization of a Corps of Artillerists and Engineers with two cadets to a company, thus creating the new grade of "cadet" in the American Army. A school for the Artillerists and Engineers, and for the cadets attached to the Corps, was established, on the recommendation of Washington, by order,

at West Point in 1794. The destruction of its buildings by fire, in 1796, caused its suspension. In July, 1801, the Secretary of War directed that all the cadets of the Corps of Artillerists should report at West Point for instruction, and in September, a school was opened with four army officers and a civilian as administrators and instructors.

An Act of Congress approved March 16, 1802, authorized the President to organize and establish a Corps of Engineers to consist of five officers and ten cadets, and provided that it should be stationed at West Point, in the State of New York, and should constitute a Military Academy. The Academy with ten cadets present, was formally opened July 4, the year of the Act.

Acts of Congress, in 1802 and 1808, authorized 40 cadets from the Artillery, 100 from the Infantry, 16 from the Dragoons, and 20 from the Riflemen; few of these were appointed, and no provision was made for them at the Academy. In 1810, the Academy was deprived of nearly all means of instruction, and officers and cadets had difficulty in obtaining their pay. During most of the year 1811, and a part of 1812, although war was imminent, academic instruction was practically abandoned. In March, 1812, the Academy was without a single instructor. Up to and including this time, 88 cadets had been graduated; they had entered without mental or physical examination, at all ages from 12 to 34, and at various times during the year.

By Act of Congress of April 29, 1812, the Academy was reorganized. The provisions of this Act have furnished the general principles upon which the Military Academy has since been conducted and controlled; a more adequate corps of professors was authorized; a maximum of 250 cadets was fixed; and the age and the mental requisites for admission were prescribed.

In 1817, under the provisions of the Act of 1812, and the able superintendency of Major Sylvanus Thayer, Corps of Engineers, the present era in the Academy's history opened.

Until 1843, a prescribed residence was not a legal qualification for appointment, but the selection of one cadet from each Congressional district had grown to be customary. In this year the custom became the law, Congress prescribing that the Corps of Cadets should consist of one from each Congressional district, one from each Territory, one from the District of Columbia, and ten from the United States at large, to be appointed by the President.

By Acts of Congress approved June 6, 1900, June 28, 1902, and March 3, 1903, the Corps of Cadets as now constituted consists of one from each Congressional district, one from each Territory, one from the District of Columbia, one from Porto Rico, two from each State at large, and forty from the United States at large, all to be appointed by the President. Those cadets appointed from States or Territories must be actual residents of the Congressional or Territorial districts, or of the District of Columbia, or of the States, respectively, from which they are appointed. Under these Acts, and under the apportionment of Members of Congress according to the 12th Census, the maximum number of cadets is 522.

The total number of graduates from 1802 to 1906 inclusive is 4530.

NOTE.—The selection of the Superintendents of the Military Academy was continued to the Corps of Engineers from the establishment of the Institution, March 16, 1802, till the passage of the law of July 13, 1866, which opened it to the entire Army. By the Act of June 12, 1868, the local Major of Williams resigned June 29, 1803, on a point of command, and pending its settlement until April 19, 1805, when he again returned to service as Chief of the Corps of Engineers present for duty. The Superintendent of the Military Academy was appointed, the command devolving upon the senior officer of the Corps of Engineers present for duty.

§ Bvt. Major P. G. T. Beauregard, Corps of Engineers, by order of John B. Floyd, Secretary of War, relieved Colonel Delafield, Jan. 23, 1861, from the superintendency of the Military Academy, but was himself displaced five days later, Jan. 28, 1861, by direction of the succeeding Secretary of War, Joseph Holt, the command again devolving upon Colonel Delafield.

BATTALION ORGANIZATION.

For instruction in infantry drill regulations and in military police and discipline, the Cadets are organized into a battalion, under the Commandant of Cadets, each company being commanded by an officer of the Army. The officers and non-commissioned officers are selected from those Cadets who have been most studious, soldier-like in the performance of their duties, and most exemplary in their general deportment. In general, the captains and lieutenants are taken from the first class; the sergeants from the second class; and the corporals from the third class.

CLASSIFICATION OF CADETS.

The Cadets are arranged in four distinct classes, corresponding with the four years of study. The Cadets employed on the first year's course constitute the **FOURTH CLASS**; those on the second year's course the **THIRD CLASS**; those on the third year's course the **SECOND CLASS**; and those on the fourth year's course the **FIRST CLASS**.

The academic year commences on the 1st of July. On, or before, that date the result of the examination held in the preceding month is announced and Cadets are advanced from one class to another. At no other time is a Cadet advanced from one class to another, unless prevented by sickness, or authorized absence, from attending the aforesaid examination; in such a case a special examination is granted; but in no case is a Cadet advanced from one class to another without having satisfied the Academic Board of his proficiency in each branch of study pursued by his class.

NOTE.—Names marked thus * in the following pages are to be attached to the next Army Register, in conformity with a regulation for the government of the Military Academy, requiring the names of the most distinguished Cadets, not exceeding five in each class, to be reported for this purpose at each Annual Examination. This practice was instituted February 10, 1818, by Hon. John Calhoun, Secretary of War.

Cadets whose names are marked thus ‡ were found deficient, and discharged.

The count for conduct, based upon the number of demerit received by a cadet each year, is

The final count in conduct for the graduating merit roll is 125. It is obtained by adding together the respective proportional parts for each of the four years, and then reducing the sums thus found to equivalent values with a maximum of 125.

INFORMATION RELATIVE TO THE APPOINTMENT AND ADMISSION OF CADETS TO THE UNITED STATES MILITARY ACADEMY.

APPOINTMENTS.

How Made.—Each Congressional District and Territory—the District of Columbia and also Porto Rico—is entitled to have one cadet at the Academy. Each State is also entitled to have two cadets from the State at large, and forty are allowed from the United States at large. The appointment from a Congressional District is made upon the recommendation of the Congressman from that District, and those from a State at large upon the recommendations of the Senators of the State. Similarly the appointment from a Territory is made upon the recommendation of the Delegate in Congress. Each person appointed must be an actual resident of the State, District or Territory from which the appointment is made.

The appointments from the United States at large and from the District of Columbia are made by the President of the United States upon his own selection. The cadet from Porto Rico, who must be a native of that island, is appointed by the President on the recommendation of the Resident Commissioner.

Date of Appointments.—Appointments are required by law to be made one year in advance of the date of admission, except in cases where, by reason of death or other cause, a vacancy occurs which cannot be provided for by such appointment in advance. These vacancies are filled in time for the next examination.

Alternates.—For each candidate appointed there may be nominated *two alternates*. The principal and each alternate will receive from the War Department a letter of appointment, and must appear for examination at the time and place therein designated*; those previously accepted by the Academic Board on certificate or mentally qualified, appearing for physical examination only.

The fitness for admission to the Academy of the principal and the alternates will be determined as prescribed in paragraphs 19, 20 and 21, Regulations U. S. Military Academy.

Should the principal and alternates not qualify for admission under the provisions of paragraph 21, they will still be entitled to appear for the examination prescribed in paragraph 19. If the principal fails to qualify, either mentally or physically, then the qualifications of the alternates will be considered and if only one has met the requirements he will be admitted; if both alternates have met the requirements the better qualified will be admitted.

The alternates, like the principal, should be designated as nearly one year in advance of the date of admission as possible.

EXAMINATION AND ADMISSION OF CANDIDATES.

The following are extracts from the Regulations of the Military Academy relating to the examination of candidates for admission and will be strictly adhered to:

19. Candidates selected for appointment, unless accepted under the provisions of paragraph 21, shall appear for mental and physical examination before boards of army officers to be convened at such places as the War Department may select,* on the first of May, annually, except when that day comes on Sunday, in which case the examination shall commence on the following Tuesday. Candidates who pass successfully will be admitted to the Academy without further examination upon reporting in person to the Superintendent at West Point before 12 o'clock noon on the 15th day of June of the same year.

20. Each candidate before he shall be admitted to the Academy as a cadet must show, by the examination provided for in paragraph 19 or by the methods prescribed in paragraph 21, that he is well versed in the following prescribed subjects, viz.: reading, writing, spelling, English grammar, English composition, English literature, arithmetic, algebra through quadratic equations, plane geometry, descriptive geography, and the elements of physical geography, especially the geography of the United States, United States history, the outlines of general history, and the general principles of physiology and hygiene.

21. The Academic Board will consider and may accept in lieu of the regular mental examination—

1st. The properly attested examination papers of a candidate who receives his appointment through a public competitive written examination covering the range of subjects prescribed in paragraph 20.

2nd. The properly attested certificate of graduation from a public high school or a State normal school, in which the course of study, together with the requirements for entrance, shall cover the range of subjects prescribed in paragraph 20.

3rd. A properly attested certificate that the candidate is a regular student of any incorporated college or university, without condition as to any subject mentioned in paragraph 20.

*The Board before which a candidate is directed to appear will be, without exception, the one convened at the place nearest or most convenient to his home, or to the school at which he is in regular attendance at the time of appointment.

Application for consideration of papers or certificates shall be made by each candidate immediately after he receives his appointment. Applications will not be received after March 15 preceding the regular examination prescribed in paragraph 19, except in cases where it has been impracticable to submit an application at an earlier date. A candidate attending a high school, who will graduate just previous to being admitted, may apply, when appointed, for permission to submit not later than June 10 preceding the date of admission, his certificate showing graduation from the high school. Such an application should be accompanied by a certificate filled out just as it will be filled out when the applicant graduates.

Candidates accepted as qualified mentally under the provisions of this paragraph shall appear for physical examination at the time and place designated in their respective letters of appointment.

NOTE.—Applications for blank forms for preparing the certificates named above should be addressed to the Adjutant, U. S. Military Academy, West Point, N. Y.

22. Immediately after reporting to the Superintendent for admission, and before receiving his warrant of appointment, the candidate is required to sign an engagement for service in the following form, and in the presence of the Superintendent, or of some officer deputed by him:

"I, _____, of the State (or Territory) of _____, aged _____ years _____ months, do hereby engage (with the consent of my parent or guardian) that, from the date of my admission as a Cadet of the United States Military Academy, I will serve in the Army of the United States for eight years, unless sooner discharged by competent authority."

In the presence of _____

The candidate is then required to take and subscribe an oath or affirmation in the following form:

"I, _____, do solemnly swear that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and bear true allegiance to the National Government; that I will maintain and defend the sovereignty of the United States, paramount to any and all allegiance, sovereignty, or fealty I may owe to any State or country whatsoever; and that I will at all times obey the legal orders of my superior officers, and the rules and articles governing the Armies of the United States."

Sworn and subscribed, at _____, this _____ day of _____ nineteen hundred and _____ before me.

Qualifications.—No candidate shall be admitted who is under seventeen, or over twenty-two years of age, or less than five feet four inches in height at the age of seventeen, or five feet five inches in height at the age of eighteen and upwards, or who is deformed, or afflicted with any disease or infirmity which would render him unfit for the military service, or who has, at the time of presenting himself, any disorder of an infectious or immoral character. Candidates must be unmarried.

Each candidate must on reporting at West Point present a certificate showing successful vaccination within one year; or a certificate of two vaccinations, made at least a month apart, within three months.

NOTE.—Candidates are eligible for admission from the day they are seventeen until the day they become twenty-two years of age, on which latter day they are not eligible.

It is suggested to all candidates for admission to the Military Academy that, before leaving their places of residence for the place of examination, they should cause themselves to be thoroughly examined by a competent physician, and by a teacher or instructor in good standing. By such examinations any *serious* physical disqualification or deficiency in mental preparation would be revealed.

It should be understood that the informal examination herein recommended is solely for the convenience and benefit of the candidate himself, and can in no manner affect the decision of the Academic and Medical Examining Boards.

CHARACTER OF EXAMINATIONS.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION.

Every candidate is subjected to a rigid physical examination, and if there is found to exist in him any of the following causes of disqualification to such a degree as would immediately or at no very distant period impair his efficiency, he is rejected:

Candidates who are otherwise physically sound but who have diseases readily curable by operation, such as varicocele, hernia, etc., for the relief of which they consent to the necessary surgical operation, will not be rejected, but will be admitted on probation until operated upon and for such further period of time as may be necessary to determine whether or not the operation has been successful.

MENTAL EXAMINATION.

Reading.—In *reading*, candidates must be able to read understandingly, and with proper accent and emphasis. They will be required, if called upon, to define intelligently the leading words of the text read.

Writing and Spelling.—In *writing and spelling* they must be able, from dictation, to write legibly, neatly, rapidly, and correctly, sentences from standard pieces of English literature, both prose and poetry, sufficient in number to test their qualifications both in handwriting and in spelling. In *punctuation and capitals* they must be familiar with the rules for punctuation and for the use of capitals. In order to test their knowledge, sentences will be given for correction, or for this purpose a theme may be required of the candidate.

The following specimens are from a recent examination in this subject :

There was no pursuit, though the sun was still high in the Heaven when William crossed the Gette. The conquerors were so much exhausted by marching and fighting that they could scarcely move; and the horses were in even worse condition than the men. Their general thought it necessary to allow some time for rest and refreshment. The French nobles unloaded their sumpter horses, supped gaily, and pledged one another in champagne amidst the heaps of dead; and, when night fell, whole brigades gladly lay down to sleep in their ranks on the field of battle. The inactivity of Luxemburg did not escape censure. None could deny that he had in the action shown great skill and energy. But some complained that he wanted patience and perseverance. Others whispered that he had no wish to bring to an end a war which made him necessary to a Court where he had never, in time of peace, found favor or even justice. Louis, who on this occasion was perhaps not altogether free from some emotions of jealousy, contrived, it was reported, to mingle with the praise which he bestowed on his lieutenant blame which, though delicately expressed, was perfectly intelligible.

Arithmetic.—Candidates must possess such a complete knowledge of *arithmetic* as will enable them to pursue the study of such branches of mathematics as are taught at the U. S. Military Academy. They will be subject to examination only in that part of arithmetic which relates to denominate numbers, the processes of common and decimal fractions, the greatest common divisor of numbers and the least common multiple of numbers.

The following are typical questions:

Reduce $5\frac{1}{2} + \frac{7\frac{1}{2}}{0.5} - 0.725$ to an equivalent decimal.

$$\frac{4 + 3.45}{2\frac{1}{2}}$$

Multiply .0578 by $\frac{1}{4}$.

Change .013 to an equivalent fraction whose denominator is 135.

Deduce a method for finding the greatest common divisor of any two integers which cannot readily be factored.

Find the greatest common divisor of $26\frac{1}{4}$, $28\frac{3}{8}$, and $29\frac{1}{2}$.

How many men would be required to cultivate a field of $2\frac{3}{8}$ acres in $5\frac{1}{2}$ days of 10 hours each, if each man completed 77 square yards in 9 hours?

5 cubic feet of gold weigh 98.20 times as much as a cubic foot of water; and 2 cubic feet of copper weigh 13 times as much as a cubic foot of water; how many cubic inches of copper will weigh as much as $\frac{7}{8}$ of a cubic inch of gold.

Algebra.—Candidates will be required to pass a satisfactory examination in that portion of *algebra* which includes the following range of subjects: Definitions and notation; the fundamental laws; the fundamental operations, viz.: addition, subtraction, multiplication and division; factoring; highest common factor; lowest common multiple; fractions, simple and complex; simple, or linear, equations with one unknown quantity; simultaneous simple, or linear, equations with two or more unknown quantities; involution, including the formation of the squares and cubes of polynomials; evolution, including the extraction of the square and cube roots of polynomials and of numbers; theory of exponents; radicals, including reduction and fundamental operations, rationalization, equations involving radicals, operations with imaginary numbers, quadratic equations; equations of quadratic form; simultaneous quadratic equations; ratio and proportion; arithmetical and geometrical progressions. Candidates will be required to solve problems involving any of the principles or methods contained in the above subjects.

The following are typical questions:

State the Commutative, Associative, and Distributive Laws for Multiplication.

What is a homogeneous algebraic expression? Give example.

Simplify $2a - \left\{ 3a - [a - (b - c)] \right\}$.

Find the L. C. M. of

Plane Geometry.—Candidates will be required to give accurate definitions of the terms used in *plane geometry*, to demonstrate any proposition of plane geometry as given in the ordinary text-books and to solve simple geometrical problems either by a construction or by an application of algebra.

The following are typical questions:

Name and define the different kinds of triangles; of quadrilaterals.

Prove that, if a perpendicular is drawn to a given straight line at its middle point: 1st. Any point of the perpendicular is equally distant from the extremities of the line; 2d. Any point without the perpendicular, is unequally distant from the extremities.

Show that, if through the middle point of one of the sides of a triangle, a line be drawn parallel to the base, it will bisect the second side and the part intercepted will be equal to one-half the base.

What number of sides has the polygon, the sum of whose angles is twenty-six right angles?

To draw a common tangent to two given circles.

Find the locus of the middle points of all chords of a circle equal in length to a given line.

Find the locus of the middle points of all chords of a circle passing through a given point within the circle.

Prove that, through three points not in the same straight line, one circumference may always be made to pass, and but one.

Prove that, the square described on the hypotenuse of a right angled triangle is equivalent to the sum of the squares described on the other two sides.

Given the side of an equilateral triangle equal to 10 feet; find its area.

Define "limit of a variable." Illustrate by an example.

Prove that, the area of a circle is equal to the product of its circumference by half the radius.

Prove that, the bisector of an angle divides the opposite side into segments which are proportional to the other two sides.

Construct a rectangle equivalent to a given square, and having the difference of its base and altitude equal to a given line.

English Grammar.—Candidates must have a good knowledge of *English grammar*; they must be able to define the terms used therein; to define the parts of speech; to give inflections, including declension, conjugation and comparison; to give the corresponding masculine and feminine genders; to give and apply the ordinary rules of syntax.

They must be able to parse correctly any ordinary sentence; giving the subject of each verb, the governing word of each objective case, the word for which each pronoun stands or to which it refers, the words between which each preposition shows the relation, precisely what each conjunction and each relative pronoun connects, what each adjective and adverb qualifies or limits, the construction of each infinitive, and generally to show a good knowledge of the function of each word in the sentence.

They must be able to correct in sentences or extracts any ordinary grammatical errors.

It is not required that any particular text-book shall be followed; but the definitions, parsing, and corrections must be in accordance with good usage and common sense.

In English Composition and English Literature.—Candidates must have a fair knowledge of the general principles and leading rules of composition. Their knowledge will be tested by the correction of errors in the selection and right use of words, of errors in the construction of sentences, by their proficiency in variety of expression, and by their ability to write a letter in the correct form.

They must have a fair knowledge of the names of the most prominent American and English authors and the names of their principal works.

Questions similar to the following are likely to be used:

Indicate the errors in the selection and use of words in the following sentences by underscoring the errors and writing the correct word above the incorrect :

1. He had exceptionable opportunities for learning the language.

Geography.—Candidates will be required to pass a satisfactory examination, in *descriptive geography* and the elements of *physical geography*. A preponderance of weight is attached to a knowledge of the geography of the United States.

In descriptive geography of the United States, candidates should be thoroughly informed as to its general features and boundaries (both with respect to neighboring countries, and latitude and longitude); its adjacent oceans, seas, bays, gulfs, sounds, straits, and islands; its lakes, the location and extent of its mountain ranges; the sources, directions, and terminations of the important rivers, the names of their principal tributaries, and at what points, if any, these rivers break through highlands on their way to the ocean; the water routes of communication from one part of the country to another; the location and termination of important railroad lines; the boundaries of the several States and Territories and their order along the coasts, frontiers and principal rivers; the locations and boundaries of the island possessions; and the names and locations of the capitals and other important cities of the several States, Territories and Island possessions.

In short, the knowledge should be so complete that a clear mental picture of the whole of the United States is impressed on the mind of the candidate.

In descriptive geography of other countries, candidates should be familiar with the continental areas and grand divisions of the water of the earth's surface; the large bodies of water which in part or wholly surround the grand divisions of the land; the capes, from what parts they project and into what waters, the principal peninsulas, location, and by what waters embraced; the parts connected by an isthmus; the principal islands, location and surrounding waters; the seas, gulfs, and bays, the coasts they indent, and the waters to which they are subordinate; the straits, the lands they separate, and the waters they connect; the location of the principal lakes; the locations, boundaries, capitals and principal cities of the political divisions of the world.

In physical geography, candidates should be familiar with the relief of the earth's surface; the principal mountain systems, the river systems and watersheds; the coastal and lake plains; and the influence of climate, soil, mineral deposits and other physical features on the resources, industries, commercial relations and development of a country and its people, especially of the United States.

In general history, candidates must have a fair knowledge of the general outlines of the history of the following nations: Egyptian, Assyrian, Babylonian, Persian, Grecian, and Roman; and of the mediæval and modern history of the European nations.

The following questions show the character of the examination in U. S. History and in General History:

 23. Under what two forms of government did Napoleon rule France, and what was the "Code Napoleon"?
 24. When and under what circumstances was the new German Empire founded?
 25. Name some of the more important events of Queen Victoria's reign.

Physiology and Hygiene.—Candidates must be able to pass a satisfactory examination in the general principles of *physiology and hygiene* with special reference to the nature and the effects of alcoholic drinks and other narcotics upon the human system.

They must be able to state the general effects of alcohol upon the cells and tissues of the body and upon the processes of digestion, its effects on the liver, lungs and heart, on the blood, blood vessels, and on the nervous system, on the moral powers and the capacity for physical endurance; its hereditary effects; the origin and nature of alcoholic beverages; the general effects of tobacco on the cells and tissues of the young and on the digestive organs, its effects on the throat, on the heart, on the blood, on the nervous system; the effects of opium on the stomach and on the nervous system; the influence of tea and coffee on the system.

Questions similar to the following are likely to be used:

1. What are the two important offices of the bones? Describe the internal minute structure of the bone.
2. Name in order the different parts of the alimentary canal.
3. Indicate by diagram the shape of the human stomach; mark the left side when in position.
4. What is the mucous membrane—its structure; the serous membrane—its use?
5. What in general is the effect of alcohol and tobacco on the living cells; what is the only absolute safeguard against the narcotic appetite?
6. What chronic effect is often produced on the stomach by the habitual use of alcohol?
7. Name in order all the channels through which the air passes in respiration; in what part of the circuit does it aerate the blood?
8. What is the average amount of air taken in at one inspiration; what changes are observed in the expired air?
9. What is the usual effect on the stomach of the habitual use of alcohol?
10. Name two well determined effects of alcohol upon the liver.
11. What is meant by the general circulation of the blood?
12. What are the two systems of channels for the circulation of the blood? Describe the structure of each.
13. Starting with the blood in the right auricle describe its course through the body until it returns to the same receptacle?
14. What are the three agencies instrumental in returning the blood from the different parts of the system to the heart?
15. What are the effects of alcohol on the blood—of tobacco?
16. What are the effects of alcohol on the heart—what is the explanation of the fact that alcohol sometimes increases the rapidity of heart-beats?
17. What is the effect of tobacco that produces the disease known as the "tobacco heart"?
18. Describe the structure of the skin—what are the functions of the skin?
19. What is the explanation of the disease "aneurism" when due to alcohol?
20. Under what two heads may we in general class the changes produced by alcohol on the structures of the organs—which of these is due to the stronger beverages?

ACADEMIC DUTIES.

The Academic duties and exercises commence on the 1st day of September and continue until about the 5th of June. Examinations of the several classes are held in December and June. At the December examination cadets, who are found to be proficient in their studies, are arranged according to merit in each subject. At the June examination they are similarly arranged and they are also assigned general standing in the class as determined by their standings in the various subjects. When a subject of study is completed during a term an examination concluding the work in that subject is sometimes held. Cadets deficient in studies at any examination are discharged from the Academy unless for special reasons the Academic Board recommends otherwise. Cadets exceeding at any time the maximum number of demerits allowed for six months are immediately reported to the Academic Board as deficient in conduct and are discharged.

PHYSICAL EXAMINATION.

All cadets are examined physically in June of each year and those found physically disqualified to continue with the course or, in case of the first class, for commission in the Army, are discharged.

VACATIONS AND LEAVES OF ABSENCE.

Academic duties are suspended from the completion of the June examinations until the end of August. During this period cadets live in camp and are engaged in military duties and exercises and in receiving practical instruction in military and other subjects. Academic duties are also suspended from the close of the semi-annual examination, about December 23rd, until January 2nd, and on the Friday and Saturday preceding the last Sunday in March. All duties and exercises, as far as practicable, are suspended on New Year's Day, February 22nd, May 30th, July 4th, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day.

Cadets of the first, second and third classes are allowed short leaves of from four to six days at Christmas, if their conduct during the preceding six months has been satisfactory. Cadets of the first class, having satisfactory conduct records, are allowed leaves, not to exceed 75 hours, at the beginning of the summer encampment and leaves not to exceed 27 hours at Thanksgiving. Excepting these short leaves for good conduct, cadets are allowed but one leave of absence during the four years course. As a rule this leave is granted at the end of the first two years and extends from the middle of June to the 28th of August.

PAY OF CADETS.

The pay of a cadet is \$500 per year and one ration per day, or commutation therefor at thirty cents per day. The total is \$609.50, to commence with his admission to the Academy. The actual and necessary traveling expenses of candidates from their homes to the Military Academy are credited to their accounts *after* their admission as cadets.

No cadet is permitted to receive money, or any other supplies, from his parents, or from any person whomsoever, without the sanction of the Superintendent. A *most rigid* observance of this regulation is urged upon all parents and guardians, as its violations would make distinctions between cadets which it is the especial desire to avoid; the pay of a cadet is sufficient, with proper economy, for his support.

Each cadet must keep himself supplied with the following mentioned articles, viz.:

*Eight white shirts; two gray shirts; *eight summer undershirts; *six winter undershirts; *four night shirts; twelve white linen collars; twelve pairs of white linen cuffs; *eight pairs of summer drawers; *six pairs of winter drawers; *eight pairs of socks; *twelve pocket handkerchiefs; one black tie; *twelve towels; two clothes bags, made of ticking; two pairs of uniform shoes; six pairs of uniform white gloves; two sets of white belts; *one clothes brush; *one hair-brush; *one tooth-brush; *one comb; one mattress; one pillow; four pillow-cases; six sheets; two blankets; one quilted bed cover; one chair; one tumbler; *one trunk; one account book; one wash basin.

Candidates are authorized to bring with them the articles marked *.

Cadets are required to wear the prescribed uniform. All articles of their uniform are of a designated pattern, and are sold to cadets at West Point at regulated prices.

DEPOSIT PRIOR TO ADMISSION.

Immediately after being admitted to the Academy a cadet must be provided with an outfit of uniform, &c., the cost of which is between \$100 and \$150. *The sum of \$100 must be deposited with the Treasurer of the Academy before the candidate is admitted.* This deposit is used as far as it will go towards defraying the expenses of the cadet's outfit. It is best for a candidate to take with him no more money than he needs for his traveling expenses, and for his parents to send the required deposit of \$100 by draft, payable to "The Treasurer, U. S. Military Academy". *The deposit is not returned to the cadet or to his parents.* Upon graduation a cadet who has exercised proper economy should have enough money to his credit with the Treasurer of the Academy to purchase his uniform and equipment as an officer.

PROMOTION AFTER GRADUATION.

The attention of applicants and candidates is called to the following provisions of an Act of Congress approved May 17, 1886, to regulate the promotion of graduates of the United States Military Academy:—

"That when any cadet of the United States Military Academy has gone through all its classes and received a regular diploma from the Academic Staff, he may be promoted and commissioned as a second lieutenant in any arm or corps of the Army in which there may be a vacancy and the duties of which he may have been judged competent to perform; and in case there shall not at the time be a vacancy in such arm or corps, he may, at the discretion of the President, be promoted and commissioned in it as an additional second lieutenant, with the usual pay and allowances of a second lieutenant, until a vacancy shall happen."

DEPARTMENT OF TACTICS.

ALL CLASSES.

New cadets, upon reporting for duty, are given Infantry recruit instruction with gymnastic and calisthenic exercises until they join the battalion in camp.

Practical instruction is given during the summer encampment, and from September 1st to November 1st, and from March 15th to June 1st, in cavalry, artillery and infantry drill regulations, in target practice with the rifle, revolver, mountain gun and field gun, and in Military Engineering.

During the summer encampment, cadets of the third and fourth classes are also taught swimming and dancing, and those of the first class, the service of sea-coast artillery and sub-marine defense at Fort Totten, N. Y.; all classes participate in exercises in minor tactics, practice marches, problems and practical field work, in which the employment of all arms is exemplified.

Practical instruction in fencing and gymnastic exercises is given to the fourth class from September 15th to March 15th, and to the other classes from November 1st to March 15th.

Instruction in riding is given to the first class during the encampment and from September 1st to June 1st, excepting the month of February; to the second class, from November 1st to March 31st, and to the third class from November 1st to March 15th and during the summer encampment. Instruction with English pad saddles is given to the first class, and in polo to the first and second classes.

DEPARTMENT OF MATHEMATICS.

FOURTH AND THIRD CLASSES.

The course in Mathematics begins with the fourth class year and continues for nearly two years (ending April 15, of the third class year). Algebra and the elements of Geometry alternate daily during the first term of the fourth class year, an examination being held in each of these subjects in December. Algebra is then pursued, alternating with Trigonometry, until the end of March, when both of these subjects are concluded by an examination. The analytical study of the Conic Sections finishes the work of the fourth class, and is the subject of an examination in June.

The course in Algebra covers the entire subject as generally taught in colleges and universities, but the student is expected to have already mastered elementary algebra to include the progressions and the solution of the quadratic equation. The simpler parts of the subject are therefore only briefly reviewed. The course in elementary Geometry includes the books that relate to the plane and those that relate to space, but the student is expected to have mastered the former, so that they are merely rapidly reviewed. Both plane and spherical Trigonometry are studied, and the analytical course in the Conic Sections includes the discussion of the general equation of the second degree.

The first term of the third class year begins with Analytical Solid Geometry alternating with Descriptive Geometry. The former is a brief course ending with an examination about October 22. It includes the general discussion of surfaces of the second degree. In Descrip-

tive Geometry, besides the elementary problems with the right line and plane, the representation and intersection of conicoids are studied, as well as their tangent planes. This subject also includes perspective, shades and shadows, and, for the upper part of the class, spherical projections. The examination in Descriptive Geometry is held in December at the termination of this course.

The subject of the Calculus is taken up at the beginning of the second term of the third class year and is completed by an examination about April 12th. The Differential and Integral Calculus are studied separately. A small portion of the class, comprising the most advanced students, takes a brief course during April in the Theory of Errors and Method of Least Squares.

DEPARTMENT OF MODERN LANGUAGES.

FOURTH AND THIRD CLASSES.

The course in Modern Languages begins with the fourth class and continues for two years, ending in June of the third class year.

The first term, fourth class, September 1st to about December 22d, is taken up by a study of the principles of Composition and Rhetoric, and by a short study of the history of the English Language and English Literature. In this course there are 56 advance lessons and 22 review lessons.

Synonyms are studied throughout the course in Modern Languages.

An examination is held in December after the completion of the above course in English.

The second term, fourth class, January 2d to about June 4th, is devoted to the study of French. In this course there are 108 lessons, the first five of which are devoted solely to pronunciation. Each day's lesson after the fifth consists of one or more verbs, a grammar lesson, and beginning with the 19th lesson, an exercise in reading, either at sight or after preparation.

An examination is held in June after the completion of the above course.

The first term of the third class is devoted to the study of French. This course consists of 92 lessons. Each day's lesson consists of one or more verbs, a grammar lesson, reading either after preparation or at sight, and one or two French idioms. A French newspaper and a French military journal are used in reading in this course. The newspaper is used for sight reading.

An examination is held in December after the completion of this course.

The second term, third class, is devoted to the study of Spanish, and to an additional course of 40 lessons in English Composition. In the Spanish course, there are 128 lessons, the first five of which are devoted solely to pronunciation. Thereafter each lesson consists of one or more verbs, a grammar lesson, and beginning with the 19th lesson, a reading from an assigned exercise. Cadets are also required to read at sight from a Spanish newspaper.

In addition to the above course in Spanish, there are 40 lessons, beginning April 15, devoted to conversation only.

Beginning April 15, there is an additional course in English, devoted to composition and to military and civil correspondence, a composition or theme being required every week. During this period, each cadet is required to read a group of four books, each group consisting of a novel, a poem, an essay, and a play. At the end of the course, each cadet is required to hand in a written composition on one of these books and an oral examination is also held at the end of the course.

DEPARTMENT OF DRAWING.

THIRD AND SECOND CLASSES.

The course in Drawing is carried on through the third class and second class years.

It begins with instruction in the use of drawing instruments and practice exercises in line work, and proceeds to the construction of twenty-eight problems in the application of Plane Geometry. Following this, Descriptive Geometry is taken up concurrently with theoretical instruction in the Department of Mathematics, and a set of practical problems in plane and curved surfaces, with developments, shades shadows and perspective, is constructed. The number and difficulty of the problems vary with the capacity of the student. A short course of lettering is then pursued, after which the subject of Topography is begun, starting with contour problems, and the study of terrain conformation; next conventional signs, American and foreign, are taught; after which studies in map reading, American and foreign, are given by question-sheets and written examinations. These are followed by a finished map, figured and lettered, based upon some one of the issues of the U. S. Geological Survey. After a short practice in the laying of flat and graded color washes, the latter part of the academic year is taken up with the theory, and practice in the field, of military topographical reconnaissance.

Theoretical instruction in the above subjects is given by text books (department pamphlets) and by lectures.

The graphical work of the second class year begins with a study of building construction consisting of a plan, section, and elevation drawing of a barrack for a company of infantry; this is worked out to scale from detail sheets and printed specifications. Upon completion of this, the class is divided according to probable standing and corps assignment at time of graduation, and subjects in civil and military engineering, ordnance and machine design, and building construction work, are assigned according to this rating. This work completes the course in technical drawing at the end of January. At that time, Free-hand Drawing is begun with the study of block forms, passing into structural form. Memory drawing and free-hand mechanical sketching, followed by military field sketching, from the flat and in the field, close the course.

Theoretical instruction on the second class course is given by text books (department pamphlets) and lectures. The latter include: eight lectures on Building Construction; three on the History and Development of Architecture; two on Masterpieces of Painting and Sculpture; two on Military Field Sketching; one on Outline and Free-hand Drawing; one on Axometric Projection. The class is taken in the spring to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York City, and its members are required to write a thesis upon certain works specified for examination.

DEPARTMENT OF NATURAL AND EXPERIMENTAL PHILOSOPHY.

SECOND CLASS.

The course in Natural and Experimental Philosophy begins with the third academic year. Mechanics is studied during the first term. The text used is Michie's "Elements of Analytical Mechanics." This is supplemented by a book of notes containing explanations and practical problems. Many of the principles are illustrated by apparatus in the lecture and section rooms, and the students are required to repeat and explain these experiments. The course aims to be as complete as possible with the limitation that it can be properly covered in a term of 90 days by students having a proficient knowledge of the calculus; the treatment is sufficiently mathematical to furnish a confident basis for advanced work in the technical staff corps after graduation. The more difficult applications are taken by the best students in a special course of nine advance lessons, while the remainder of the class is occupied with a supplementary review of fundamental principles.

During the second term about 112 lessons are allotted to this department. The first half of this time is devoted to the subjects of Sound and Light. The authorized text book is Gordon's "Sound and Light."

Astronomy is studied in the remainder of the second term. The texts used are Young's "General Astronomy" and Michie and Harlow's "Practical Astronomy." The principal aim of this course, in addition to its important value in educational development, is to furnish an ample basis for the establishment of stations in explorations and surveys.

DEPARTMENT OF CHEMISTRY, MINERALOGY AND GEOLOGY.

SECOND CLASS.

This department embraces two branches of Physics not included in its title, namely Heat and Electricity.

The course begins with the third academic year and extends throughout the year, exercises, recitations, laboratory work or lectures taking place on all week days.

Commencing with the first term, September 1st, the subjects of Heat and General Chemistry alternate daily until the completion of the former subject, about October 18th, after which the Chemistry exercises are held daily until the close of the term.

During this term all members of the class whose progress, as shown by the recitations, warrants it, are given laboratory practice in Chemistry. This practice begins with chemical manipulations and proceeds in the usual general order of elementary laboratory work. The laboratory exercises are one hour and fifty minutes long. It is generally possible to give all parts of the class some laboratory experience; the amount of this work, however, varies with the aptitude of the student from a few hours to fifty-five or sixty hours.

The first term closes with an examination upon the essential parts of the entire course, which all cadets who have not shown a prescribed proficiency in daily work must take.

The course in Heat is short but it is a comprehensive elementary course intended to embrace what is most applicable to subsequent work at the Academy and what is most useful in general education. In Chemistry the course is a descriptive general one, based upon a concise statement of the more essential principles of Chemistry, and includes that class of chemical information deemed most important to non-specialists, together with an accurate and logical treatment of many useful applications of Chemistry.

During the second term the daily exercises alternate between Electricity, and Mineralogy and Geology. During February and April only half the class attends daily. The course in Geology is a brief but scientific presentation of the essential elements of this branch of science.

The Mineralogy is an eminently practical course consisting of the descriptive study and the practical determination of the important minerals. The lithological and palaeontological part of Geology is accompanied in study by the continued practical examination of the objects described.

The course in Electricity is a brief exposition of the leading electrical phenomena and their relations to each other. It includes a study of the general principles of the subject and of the typical machines, generators, motors and transformers, together with the more important uses of electricity. The laboratory exercises give experience with a number of the machines and in the use of a great variety of apparatus employed in the numerous forms of electric measurements. In this term the laboratory work is a part of the electrical course and all cadets enter the laboratory. All laboratory work is performed under the immediate supervision of an instructor.

The second term like the first, closes with an examination covering the essential parts of the three subjects embraced.

DEPARTMENT OF MILITARY HYGIENE.

SECOND CLASS.

The course in Military Hygiene for the second class begins on or about the 15th of April and continues into June. It consists of ten lectures and ten recitations for each half of the class, given on alternate days and ending by a written examination on the subjects treated.

The course covers the essential points in Military Hygiene, with especial reference to tropical service; the elements of Physiology and Personal Hygiene; and the effects of stimulants and narcotics upon the human system.

During the summer camp, five lectures with exercises, are given to the first class on the use of the First Aid Packet and emergencies. In this course, cadets are taught the location of the principal blood vessels and means of stopping hemorrhage, etc. While on the march, at the end of each day, the surgeon on duty with the Corps explains the sanitary advantages or disadvantages of the camp sites and the principles of camp cooking.

DEPARTMENT OF CIVIL AND MILITARY ENGINEERING.

FIRST CLASS.

The course in Civil and Military Engineering and the Art of War is confined to the first class year.

The course in Civil Engineering begins September 1st and is completed during the first term, which closes with the Christmas holidays. It comprises brief treatises on the mechanics of civil engineering, framed and masonry structures, the materials of engineering, water supply and sewerage.

The course in Military Engineering and the Art of War begins on January 2nd and closes on the 3rd of June. Military Engineering embraces the study of field and permanent fortifications and siege works. The Art of War embraces the study of the organization of armies, employment of the different arms in combination, logistics and strategy. To familiarize the students with its principles, lectures are delivered on military subjects and the principal operations of about twenty selected campaigns are studied. During this course the students

are taken to the battlefield of Gettysburg to familiarize them with the effects of topography on the employment of troops in the field.

DEPARTMENT OF LAW AND HISTORY.

FIRST CLASS.

The subjects of Law and History are taught in the first class year.

Each cadet is required to recite upon the day's lesson orally in reply to questions, or from subject headings placed on the blackboard, or by written answers to questions covering the leading points of the entire lesson. After recitation cadets are usually directed to selected readings in the reference library of the department, in connection with the lesson or subject.

At the end of each term those cadets who have not established their proficiency in either subject to the satisfaction of the Academic Board, are subject to an examination thereon.

HISTORY.

The course in History begins September 1st and ends about December 22d, and consists of the study of a condensed General History of the World. In many respects the course is an advanced study of the subject as required of candidates by the entrance examinations of the Academy. Special attention is given to sociology and political science, by verbal instruction, by the insertion at the proper places in the text of articles upon such subjects as: "The Origin of the Village Community"; "The Oriental Empires"; "Taxtaking and Legislating Empires"; "The Roman Constitution," etc., and by requiring cadets in the preparation of their answers to refer to relevant books and articles designated by the instructors. Instruction in Historical Geography is given by use of outline maps in connection with recitations. In addition to such lectures of the department as are given in any time available therefor, the present course embraces a series of eight lectures (by Dr. James H. Canfield, Columbia University) upon the following subjects, viz.:

The Beginning of Civilization.	What the Germans have Accomplished.
Early Oriental Civilization.	The Influence of France.
The Advance made by the Greeks.	The Place and Value of the English.
The Roman State.	Modern Western Civilization.

LAW.

The course in Law begins on January 2d each year and extends to June. It covers instruction in the following subjects:

1. The Elements of Law.	3. International Law.
2. Constitutional Law.	4. Military Law and the Practice of Courts-Martial.

In addition to the recitations, "Cases" involving important points of law are given out for study and cadets are required to state the legal conclusions to be drawn therefrom.

Lectures are also given upon the various subjects taught, so far as the limits of time allotted to this course permit, and practical instruction is given in the organization, method of procedure, making up the record, etc., of general courts-martial.

DEPARTMENT OF ORDNANCE AND GUNNERY.

FIRST CLASS.

The subject of Ordnance and Gunnery is studied by the cadets of the first class throughout the academic year.

The course of instruction covers the principles involved in the construction and use of all war material. It is broadly divided into two parts: the theoretical and the descriptive. The theoretical part includes the study of the action of explosives, the study of interior and exterior ballistics, the theories of gun and carriage construction, and the principles of gunnery. The principles studied are applied in the solution of problems of a practical nature and in practical work with ballistic instruments.

The descriptive part of the course covers the processes of manufacture of powders, guns, gun carriages, projectiles and armor; and describes the small arms, cannon, machine and rapid fire guns in use in the United States service, with the carriages, ammunition and accessory appliances required for their service. The department is well supplied with models, which are used in conjunction with the text.

In connection with the course, visits are made to Watervliet Arsenal, where the processes of gun construction are observed, and to the Ordnance Proving Grounds at Sandy Hook, where actual firings from the several classes of guns are observed, including usually one or more shots against armor, and where the latest developments in war material are seen.

DEPARTMENT OF PRACTICAL MILITARY ENGINEERING.

THIRD, SECOND AND FIRST CLASSES.

During the summer encampment cadets of the third class are instructed in the use and adjustment of surveying instruments, in surveying methods, and in keeping and plotting notes. Each cadet receives about four hours of instruction per day for twelve days.

The second class receives instruction in Signalling with the flag and heliograph either during the fall or spring drill season.

The first class during the fall and spring drill season and during the summer encampment receives instruction in the following subjects:

Field geometry; profiling, defilading; road location; stream discharge measurements; use of field ovens; filtration of water; and felling timber with explosives; knots and lashings; making gabions, fascines; wire entanglements; the use of gins, shears, derricks; raising masts; gun emplacements; field latrines; revetments; military mines; use of screw and hydraulic jacks; spar bridges; mounted reconnoissance; mixing and placing concrete; rafts of casks; putting up pile driver; building pile dock; ponton bridges with wooden and canvas pontoons; trestle bridge with Birago trestle; loading bridge material on wagons.

Cadets are marked on all of the above practical work and proficiency is required. No text books are used, but cadets have access to a complete line of books of reference.

THE LIBRARY.

Cadets and officers have free access to the library which comprises some 60,000 books, maps and manuscripts. The collection contains substantially all standard books on the subjects taught in the Academy and is especially complete in military subjects. Its card catalogues (about 130,000 cards) are arranged with the special object of saving the time of cadets. The library is open on week days from 8 A. M. to 9:30 P. M.
